By creating a twice weekly meeting space for friends of Camphill Soltane, the Greenhouse Café has blossomed into a charming, serene place to meet friends, enjoy the scenery and catch up over a cup of high quality coffee. # Meet Robert Ceramics Apprentice

Robert has worked with me as an apprentice for more than a year. While our focus is on the ceramics studio, we have had a wide range of projects that takes us all around campus. Together we have reorganized the woodshop, installed art in the greenhouse and herb garden, and fixed up an old rabbit hutch as a house for Penelope the Pig. We also have a process of finding furniture on campus in need of repair, taking it to the woodshop to fix it up and refinish or paint it, and then finding a place where the piece can be useful.



Robert didn't have much clay experience before working with me, but has really taken to it. His first project was a collection of talismans: discs a few inches wide that he carved different patterns into and then glazed with bright colors. He has begun to make small figures, with different hats and facial expressions. He helps prepare the studio for my afternoon classes, and sets a good example for my students as we work on different pieces together during class.

While he needed some time to get used to Soltane (I remember him saying "I don't do crowds,") Robert has become comfortable joining group activities like our weekly community forum and picking apples in our orcahrd. He was integral in training my dog Woody as I started bringing him to work. We have become such a team that if I enter a room by myself the first questions are "Where's Robert?" and "Where's Woody?"

Robert has just started his freshman year at West Chester University, and maintains his connection to Soltane by joining me each week as an apprentice. We have more to explore in the ceramics studio, and I am excited to see what we make together.

**5 organizations** share Soltane's campus: The Camphill School, The Camphill Foundation, The Camphill Academy, Karl König Institute, and Parzival. In the last year, Soltane hosted over 25 conferences, trainings, & events for mission aligned/like-minded Camphill, anthroposophical, or neurofeedback organizations, serving **400+ people.** 



## Camphill Association of North America

The Camphill Association of North America (CANA) had its Annual General Meeting in New Orleans, LA at Raphael Village May 19-21, 2023. Kathleen and I were so arateful to represent Soltane as the two designated to the board of CANA and spend a few days getting to know New Orleans. This was Kathleen's first trip to the Big Easy, so she soaked in all of the culture and excitement of the city!

The Annual General
Meeting of CANA had
multiple necessary business
agenda points including
approving the budget for
next year and reviewing last
year's work, but within the
few days at Raphael
Village, we were able to
familiarize ourselves with
the work, geography, and
history of New Orleans. We
saw how all of these forces
worked together to create

and impact the urban Camphill. All of the trustees toured Raphael Village's school (Raphael Academy), day program town center (The Guild), and cafe (Dragonfly Cafe). We also saw an amazing presentation by The Guild members that explained the four major festivals that are celebrated at Raphael Village. All of the trustees were guests in Jackie Case's (Executive Director of Raphael Village) home for meals. We pet her dogs and cooled off from the NOLA heat in her pool all while reconnecting with friends from far and wide.

I found a visit to Audubon
Park the most impactful part
of our time. This park holds
so much history of the city,
its native people, and its
colonialist founding, along
with being the home of the
almost 300 year old Tree of
Life.

As a group of about 30 people, all attendees present stood on the exposed roots of the Tree of Life for a picture. We were led by Marianne Fieber, programs administrator at Raphael Village, around the park to significant milestones and sang, read poetry, and learned historical facts about the land we were on. She called this a "song trail".

Kathleen loved visiting the zoo in Audubon Park and participating in the eurythmy led by Sonja from Dornach, Switzerland.

Kathleen and I also traveled to Camphill Communities
California in October, will visit Heartbeet in Vermont in March, and Otto Specht School in New York in May.
We are looking forward to continuing our work on behalf of Camphill Soltane!

#### 1988-1992

Camphill Soltane is founded as a place for young adults to have a college-like experience in a life sharing community. Peredur opens, orchards are planted, Windcrest and Emerson houses are built.

With the opening of Saelde House in 1992, Soltane welcomes graduates of Soltane's educational program to make Soltane their long-term home.



#### 1998-2002

Soltane recognizes the value of offcampus jobs for people to expand their horizons and make an impact in their wider communities. Local business leaders play a key role in developing a network of job placements, while vocational opportunities at Soltane continue to grow!

Gawain and Nantmeal Road tunnel are built, and the Wine & Fine Dining event begins, co-founded by Dr. Johanna Allston and Ted Swinnerton.



# Celebrating 35 Years of Soltane

#### 1993-1997

Iduna is built! Iduna's spacious Rose Room is Soltane's first community space. Nantmel Farmhouse opens and Rockrose is built. Soltane's educational program, Learning for Life, continues to grow and thrive with a diversity of classes and vocational training opportunities.

Whitsun Hall is built, providing Soltane with a gymnasium, stage, art gallery, library, and more classrooms.



#### 2003-2007

Roland Johnson Building opens with five apartments for semi-assisted living, signaling Soltane's readiness to offer more diverse living options. Soltane bell choir performs at Carnegie Hall! Beloved community member, Annegret Goetze, passes away.

#### 2008-2012

With the widening age gap between students and long-term residents, Soltane re-defines its educational and vocational programs to better meet the changing needs of each group. Soltane becomes a qualified provider of adult day services. Recognizing its dual role as both a Camphill community and human services provider, Soltane opens up the possibility for people to apply their public funding to the day program. Our first fully integrated social enterprise, Soltane Café, opens in Phoenixville in 2011.

Soltane opens two homes in Phoenixville, providing options for more independent urban living while remaining connected to Soltane through the day program.

#### 2018-2020

Soltane opens Community Arts Phoenixville, offering art classes and gallery space for artists with and without disabilities. The Soltane Store becomes the Entwine Store, and the Soltane Association is founded.



Longtime Soltane community member, Kristina Benzon, passes away. Dr. Beth Barol joins the Soltane Board of Directors as Board Chair. Social enterprises close due to the pandemic, and Soltane pivots to meet the needs of a community in crisis.

#### 2013-2017

Soltane continues to grow its presence in Phoenixville with six residential homes. Emerson transitions to a Day Supports Center for Soltane's growing day program. Soltane founder Christl Bender passes away.



Kristina's House is built as Soltane's fourseason horticultural center, and Soltane founds Parzival, a partner organization focusing on residential services.

#### 2020-2023, and beyond!

Dr. Beth Barol becomes Executive Director and spearheads the development of Soltane Therapeutic Services, offering therapies, training, and trauma healing in a host of modalities.

Kristina's House becomes a vibrant community space with the addition of the Greenhouse Café and Memorial Garden. We host our first Empowered Healing Immersion, and welcome four Camphill-related organizations to share our campus. Lauren Prince steps into the Executive Director role in 2023.






## Financials Reflecting Fiscal Year 7/1/22 - 6/30/2023


